GENERAL INFORMATION FOR EXHIBITORS

Classification and placement are the responsibility of the exhibitor. Clerks will be present to assist with classification and placement questions. Judging rules in Division III and IV will be similar to rules and practices of the Reno-Sparks Executive Board of Garden Clubs and are listed below. The entry preparation area behind the California Building opens at 7:00 am.

Note that only judges, clerks, and authorized Committee personnel will be permitted in the show area during judging.

DIVISION III
NON-ARS HORTICULTURE SECTION
RULES AND INFORMATION FOR EXHIBITORS

1. This Division will be governed by the rules and guidelines in this schedule. All judging in Division III will be based on quality and perfection guidelines in the Handbook for Flower Shows of the National Council of State Garden Clubs and decisions of the judges shall be final.
2. Flowers must be grown outdoors in the Sierra Nevada area by the exhibitor.
3. Show area will be open to entries from 8:00 to 10:30 am on June 13. Preparation area will open at 7:00 am. All entries must remain in place until 5:00 pm and should be removed at the close of show on June 13, 2009.
4. All entries must conform to the schedule or be disqualified.
5. Cut specimens exceeding 30 inches from the tip of the specimen to the cut end will be disqualified.
6. Entry tags for Division III entries will be furnished by the Reno Rose Society.
7. Containers will be provided. The use of colored water is prohibited.
8. Wedges, provided by the exhibitor, may be used, but must not protrude above the lip of the container.
9. This is an alphabetically arranged variety show. **Each variety shall constitute a separate subclass within a class.** Only one entry per class or subclass per exhibitor/team is allowed.
10. First, second, third, and honorable-mention ribbons will be awarded as warranted, but judges may withhold any at their discretion. Trophies and certificates will be awarded only to specimens meriting first place (blue) ribbons.
11. Only Blue Ribbon Entries marked with “novice” or “n” following the class designation are eligible for an Novice certificates, awards, or trophies. A novice is anyone who has not previously won a blue ribbon.
12. The Reno Rose Society assumes no responsibility for loss, injury to persons, or damage to property.

DIVISION III — ENTRY CLASSES

SECTION 1 FLOWERING TREES, SHRUBS AND VINES

Class 101 Flowering Trees *One cut specimen not to exceed 30"*

(includes hawthorne, golden chain, tulip tree, dogwood, fruit trees, others)

Class 102 Flowering Shrubs *One cut specimen not to exceed 30"* .

(including azalea, mock orange, potentilla, spirea, quince, others). Roses should be exhibited in Division I or Section 2 of Division III

Class 103 Vines in Flower *One cut specimen not to exceed 30"*

SECTION 2 ROSES (CULTIVAR NAME UNKNOWN) *Should have at least two sets of leaves, any stem-on-stem will be disqualified; any rose with cultivar/variety known will be disqualified*

Class 104 Hybrid Tea or Grandiflora, *One stem, naturally grown*

Class 105 Floribunda, *One Stem, naturally grown*

Class 106 Miniature Rose, *One stem, naturally grown*

Class 107 Any other Rose *One stem, naturally grown*

class group must be written on tag (i.e. shrub, old garden rose, polyantha, climber)

Class 108 Roses of unknown classification & name, *One stem, naturally grown*

SECTION 3 PERENNIALS, BIENNIALS, ANNUALS, AND HERBS

Class 109 Large Perennials, *One stem, spray, spike, or stalk not to exceed 30"*

(Includes delphinium, lupine, anchusa, Russian sage, day lily, columbine, and others)

Class 110 Small Perennials, *Three stems of one variety exhibited in one container*

(Includes coral bells, dianthus, and others. Does not include viola family which should be in Class 111)

Class 111 Viola Family, *Naturally grown, not more than eight stems*

(pansies, violas, violets, Johnny-jump-ups)

Class 112 Biennials, *One cut stem or spike*

(includes sweet William, foxglove, canterbury bells and others not listed)

Class 113 Annuals, *Three stems of one variety exhibited in one container*

(includes California poppy, marigold, petunia, zinnia, and others)

Class 114 Herbs, *Three stems of one variety exhibited in one container*

SECTION 4 IRIS

Class 115 Bearded Iris, *one stalk*

Class 116 Dutch Iris, *one stalk*

Class 117 Any other Iris, *one stalk*

SECTION 5 BULBS AND BULB-LIKE PLANTS

Class 118 Oriental and Asiatic Lilies, *One stem*

Class 119 Large variety not to include lilies, *One stem*

Class 120 Small variety not to include lilies, *Three stems in one container*

SECTION 6 ORNAMENTAL GRASSES/GRASS-LIKE PLANTS

Class 121 Large Grasses, *One cut specimen not to exceed 30"*

Class 122 Small Grasses, *Three cut specimens in one container*
